

Libraries both shape and save lives by providing an essential service.

EPL provides a foundation for Edmonton's long-term economic success and is a key component to a comprehensive solution to the social issues of large urban centres. EPL's Outreach Program helps empower at-risk Edmontonians through social support and access to addictions counselling, medical support and housing. We are a safe, inclusive place where everyone is welcome.

Libraries drive innovation.

EPL has made digital literacy and hands-on experiences with technology a core focus. The EPL Makerspace – one of the first and largest public library makerspaces in North America – houses a variety of technologies otherwise not readily accessible. An Espresso Book Machine, 3D Printers, high-performance computers with design software, PC gaming and two sound recording booths are available (one at the Enterprise Square location and one at Whitemud Crossing). Digital literacy tools such as Lego Robotics, Snap Circuits, iPad kits, laptop kits along with classes for customers have also been added to all 20 EPL branches.

EPL's Tremendous Impact

EPL prepares parents and caregivers for a lifetime of learning.

EPL provides access to early literacy tools and resources to stimulate babies' brains and help create powerful experiences that are essential for their happy and healthy development. Providing the foundation for early literacy sets the course for a child's future, and largely determines how well children will do in school, their physical and mental health, behaviour, relationships and general well-being.


Newcomers find refuge at EPL.

EPL is the central hub for information and resources for newcomers to establish new roots—from Settlement Practitioners to help answer questions about moving and settling to Canada, to Community Librarians conducting outreach at local social service organizations and events. EPL's services also include English language conversational circles, multi-lingual programs, resources in over 20 languages and so much more.

EPL is committed to responding to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's (TRC) Calls to Action.


In 2016, EPL's Exploring Reconciliation series offered the opportunity to participate in book clubs, hear Indigenous community leaders speak, watch film screenings and much more. We also continue to acknowledge both National Metis Week and the anniversary of the Truth and Reconciliation Report and Calls to Action. In 2017, EPL introduced a new Elder in Residence program, and continues to support Indigenous writers, storytellers and communities.

EPL is helping to set a high standard for library services nationally and internationally.

1979	First public library in Canada to use a fully integrated, computerized circulation system.
